## Alphabet Tracing Cards D'Nealian Font

As your child is learning the letters, you can let them trace them with their fingers, a marker, or a crayon. The correct starting points and directions are shown in the little letters in the top left-hand corner. My daughter does not confuse " $b$ " and " $d$ " when she is writing them because each letter has a different starting point.

To make letter tracing more fun, you can fine fun ways to give them a bit of texture. Glow-in-the-dark blue is a bit more expensive, but it leaves a bit of texture. You can try white school glue or tacky glue then coat the letters with colored sand, then wait for them to dry. You and your child can create the glue-sand letters together or, if your not quite up for the mess, you can make them by yourself then let your child trace them once they are dry.

You can also just print up the letters then let them color or decorate the sheets.
The keyword pictures are included to help your child to memorize the primary sound that goes with each letter.

The letters here are in alphabetical order. However, DOG ON A LOG Books introduces them in this order:
